Celebrating Women's History Month Honoring Marsha Stevens-Pino Mother of Contemporary Christian Music

March is Women's History Month. As I thought about women who have had an effect in my life—and one who has had a profound effect on many lives all around the world—Marsha Stevens-Pino seemed just the right fit to honor. So for this Women's History Month, we honor and recognize Marsha Stevens-Pino, the mother of contemporary Christian music.

Marsha was raised in Southern California. Her father was a Disciples of Christ pastor who had been kicked out of many, many churches for molesting little girls, and her mother, who was more than 20 years younger than him, turned to alcohol and drugs to numb the pain. During this time, Marsha took care of her kid sister, trying to steer her away from what was really going on at home.

When Marsha was a teenager, her older brother—who was 15 years older than her and from her father's previous marriage—took her to a weekly beachside praise and worship service. This is where Marsha learned terms like being filled with the Holy Spirit and being born again. After the second week that she attended, her life changed forever. She felt free from all of the chaos in her life and started to realize that she didn't have to be burdened by the mess of her parents. She also wanted to be a role model and mentor for her kid sister. As she had all those feelings, she tried to tell her friends about it. Most blew her off; some even asked what she had been smoking. She was very disheartened at the reactions she received, even from her kid sister. She decided to write a song to help others understand what she was feeling.

After hours and hours of wordsmithing and work, "For Those Tears I Died" was born. She was 16 years old at the time and also played guitar. She played it for her kid sister, and her sister cried. She received the same reaction when playing it for friends and for others. A few weeks later, she played it at her church service and received a huge reaction, and somewhere in that period of time the song spread like wildfire. Suddenly everyone seemed to hear it and know it.

The song was recorded when Marsha was 17, and even though she didn't realize the effect it was having on people, it seemed to be much larger than anyone could imagine—so much so that one night she received a call from Pat Boone. He called to ask permission to record the song. For those that might not know the name Pat Boone, he is an American singer, songwriter, actor, author, television personality, radio host, and philanthropist who was popular in the 1950s through the early 1960s and sold over 50 million records during that time.

After high school, Marsha formed a band with her kid sister, Russ Stevens, and Pete Jacobs. She knew Russ and Pete from school, and they attended church with her and became Christians. The band traveled worldwide singing and even performed at one time in front of over 100,000 people at a Billy Graham crusade.

LGBTQ+ Estate Planning — A Tale of Two Couples

Chris and Jason would never leave anything to chance. They ordered their movie tickets online in case the show sold out before they got to the theater. They always bought travel insurance, on the off chance their vacation plans didn't pan out. They flossed daily, replaced smoke-detector batteries annually, and changed their furnace filters every six months.

Their friends Bill and Trevor often teased them about being so conscientious. But then Bill and Trevor took a different approach to life. When Bill got a flat tire and needed to use the spare, he discovered that it was flat, too. The couple once ran out of heating oil because Trevor forgot to order more. And they still laugh about the time they missed their cruise ship departure after enjoying one too many rum swizzles at a pub in Bermuda.



These differences extended to the way they approached estate planning, too.

Chris and Jason went to an estates and trusts attorney who was a fellow member of the LGBTQ+ community. After getting to know them, the attorney prepared wills that left everything to the survivor in case Chris or Jason died. He also drafted a power of attorney and advance healthcare directive for each of them. These documents would be essential, the lawyer explained, if Chris or Jason became incompetent and needed the other spouse to manage his finances or health care.

Chris and Jason knew this paperwork was important and were glad to have it prepared by a professional. What they didn't know was that there was more to estate planning than that.

The lawyer included language in their documents to cover their digital assets—things like frequent-flyer miles, social media accounts, and online shopping. The lawyer had them make an inventory of these assets, including their usernames and passwords, so the other spouse could access them if necessary. The inventory even included passwords for things like their laptops, smart phones, and iPads. The were also told to make sure the beneficiaries on their life insurance and retirement accounts were up to date to replicate the provisions in their wills.

Once the documents had been signed, Chris and Jason slept better. They knew they were as ready as they could be for whatever lay ahead.

Bill and Trevor, by contrast, did none of these things. They hadn't gotten married or registered as domestic partners, thinking that having "a piece of paper" wouldn't improve their relationship. They had been meaning to get wills but thought the process would be difficult and expensive. They also didn't want to think about the worst-case scenarios an estate plan was meant to cover.

Derek discovered the leather community while stationed in Connecticut with the Navy. Although it was during the time of "don't ask, don't tell, his supervisor took him to LGBTQ+ bars in Providence, Rhode Island and New York. "He protected us", Derek says.

In 2023 Derek and Nic both competed for titles at the Bears, Bikers, & Mayhem Contest in Gettysburg, Pennsylvania. Although neither took home a sash, Derek said that he really learned a lot, like do not rush the answers to your interview questions. He said he blew through all of his questions so quickly that the judges had to add additional questions! He joked that he also learned that it is very hard to keep your leather clean when spaghetti is served. After BBM, he started looking around for another leather contest and was unable to find anything he felt suited for close to home. He widened his search and selected the popular Mr. Fire Island Leather Contest in New York, which he had attended before.

Derek recommends that anyone thinking about running for a title should, at the very least, attend the contest once to observe the process.

Since becoming Mr. Fire Island 2025 in May, Derek has been busy almost every weekend being a walking advertisement for a place that he loves. From World Pride in DC, NYC Pride, the New Jersey Leather contests, ShipMates' Daddy Christmas in Baltimore, Mr. Rehoboth Leather in Delaware, Hillside, the Keystone Leather contests and many more. He has also been busy selling his pins, designed by the very popular leather community artist Scott "Coyote" Hill, who passed away last year. Proceeds from the pin sales benefit the Arts Project of Cherry Grove, a historic LGBTQ+ arts organization on Fire Island founded in 1948.

Derek's leather journey is far from over. Discouraged by the lack of inclusive leather groups in his area, he has become one of the three founding members of the Central Pennsylvania Leather Club, who are planning their first fundraiser in April. You can learn all about this new organization on Facebook. After April, he has a very busy May with Fire Island Leather weekend on May 15th - 17th and the International Mr. Leather Contest on May 21st -25th. Derek plans to drive to Chicago. So, if you see a man in a white leather sailor suit heading west, be sure to wave. It may be your chance to meet Mr. Fire Island Leather 2025.

Women's History Month - Marsh Stevens-Pino Continued

Marsha eventually married Russ Stevens, and the two had two children together. During this time, "For Those Tears I Died" was also added to church hymnals and praise books starting in 1979.

In the late 1970s the couple was attending counseling. Their marriage was broken and headed for divorce. After the breakup Russ won custody of the children and royalties from their music. The judge in the case gave very specific orders in the custody battle, including no visitation, and she could not live with anyone she was not married to or related to by blood if she wanted even to visit her children.

Marsha says this was the first time she ever felt that she had wrestled with God but realized that it was time to get her life back on track. She turned again to her faith and found a priest who ran Dignity. As she met with the priest, he shared something with her that at the time was hard to swallow. He told her that she had been a Christian long enough to know that you reap what you sow.

"I've sowed hiding and lying and trying to stay on the DL and trying to avoid people," she said, "and so if I'm going to live in the light..."

She took a training course to be a medical assistant and found a job, eventually an apartment, and after nine long months was able to regain custody of her children.

In the early 1980s Marsha came out of the closet and experienced extreme amounts of hate. People would rip the pages out of hymnals and send them to her with written messages on them. During this time, she had come to the conclusion that her musical career had ended. She also missed church—the praise and worship as well as the fellowship.

She heard about the gay church and decided to attend, sitting in the back and taking it all in at a nearby Metropolitan Community Church. A few weeks later she attended a service where Rev. Troy Perry was preaching and speaking, and he recognized her. He called her out and asked her to come sing.

At first she was so nervous she had a hard time singing and had to start over. Rev. Perry and Marsha were both fluent in the King James translation and quickly began comparing notes and sharing scripture. Troy made sure to share with her that he would like her to come and be part of the next year's UFMCC General Conference.

During this time, Marsha formed BALM Ministries (Born Again Lesbian Music), and she traveled and sang, continuing to spread the radical love of Jesus.

In 2002, Dr. Mark Allan Powell, a professor of New Testament at Trinity Lutheran Seminary, published The Encyclopedia of Contemporary Christian Music, naming Marsha as the mother of contemporary Christian music. During this time Marsha connected with old friends and found it fascinating to see where some of these people were now and what they had been doing.

But 2002 was not all celebration. On New Year's Eve, Marsha and Cindy attended a Gaither Homecoming concert and had backstage passes to meet Bill and Gloria Gaither, Mark Lowry, and others. At midnight, as they began to prepare to ring in the new year, Bill recognized Marsha as being in attendance and acknowledged her contributions to contemporary Christian music. They then performed "For Those Tears I Died," with the audience singing along.

Marsha remembers that moment. She was so struck that they selected her song she couldn't even sing—she was completely speechless.

However, after that concert a picture of her along with the Gaithers was posted on social media and became a source of controversy. Eventually, after months, Bill Gaither posted a statement and appeared on the cover of Singing News Magazine distancing himself from her.

In 2003 Marsha married her partner Cindy Pino and changed her name to Marsha Stevens-Pino. Through BALM Ministries and King of Peace MCC in St. Petersburg, Florida, they created a music ministry training program for LGBTQ+ Christians who needed help and direction in getting started.

They raised the money and created several albums, including a Christmas album of new and upcoming LGBTQ+ artists. One of those artists was Justin Ryan. Some of you might know Justin from his production Southern Gospel Sissy, who produces a weekly show on YouTube featuring some history of gospel music.

Justin has now joined BALM Ministries, and together they continue to travel, sing, and spread the good news of God's radical love.

As we finished our interview, I asked Marsha if she had a favorite verse from the Bible or Bible story. She quoted Romans 8:35–39, where Paul declares that nothing can separate believers from the love of God in Christ Jesus. This promise assures that God's love is unconditional, unbreakable, and secure, no matter what challenges or fears one faces.

As we continued to finish, what seemed to me to resound over and over in Marsha's life is the faithfulness of God, and I asked Marsha what she would like to share with our readers.

"I think that the most important thing about God's faithfulness is that it doesn't depend on you at all. That love is there for you. It's wonderful if you can open your heart to it, experience it, perceive it at work in your life. It's great if you can rest in the fact that God became human so that we'd know our pains and sorrows and fears and betrayals are felt and understood. But whether you know it or not, that mercy and grace is yours."

Finding a Voice That Feels Like You

The voice is an important component of self-expression and connection. For many transgender and nonbinary individuals, a voice that doesn't align with their gender identity can be a barrier to feeling truly seen.

The team at the Johns Hopkins Voice Center at GBMC, part of the Milton J. Dance Jr. Head and Neck Center, provides evidence-based evaluation and voice therapy for those seeking a voice that affirms their gender identity and authentic self.

In this respectful, inclusive, and supportive environment, every patient receives a comprehensive, multidisciplinary voice evaluation with a laryngologist and a licensed speech language pathologist to assess vocal health and function. Then, the team develops a personalized plan of care based on each individual's vocal and communication goals.

"Whatever is right for the patient is the right answer," Melissa Bidlack, MS, MM, CCC-SLP, speech language pathologist and coordinator, said. "We work with the patient to find the voice that feels the most like them without causing strain or discomfort. It's an evolving process. We want to empower the patient to describe the voice they want, and then it's our job to help them get there."



With access to a full range of voice-related medical, therapeutic, and surgical options, patients have choices to support their long-term goals.

Surgery is one route, and Bidlack sees patients for pre-surgical and post-surgical therapy to help them understand the mechanism and how to alter resonance and pitch. If therapy is the preferred option, patients can see one of three specially trained and certified speech-language pathologists at GBMC for a series of sessions.

"Once the patient identifies the voice they want, then we try different facilitative methods, leading into words, speech, conversation, reading, even singing if desired, to help them find their individual voice. And, if they are unsure, we work with them to figure it out," Bidlack said.

Patients often come in feeling frustrated that their voice doesn't match who they are and even traumatized at being misgendered because of it.

"To find a voice that is more representative of their whole being makes them feel a lot more comfortable interacting in public," Bidlack said. "I've had patients express they are more confident and feel more like themselves after voice therapy."

The team at GBMC provides a welcoming, accessible, and equitable experience for patients seeking this specific voice treatment. Voice is deeply personal, and their mindset of continuous learning underscores their commitment to serving patients the way they need and desire.

Affirming voice care is rooted not just in the voice itself, but in what the person behind it is saying. At GBMC, individuals are met with expertise, compassion, and choice in finding a voice that feels truly their own.

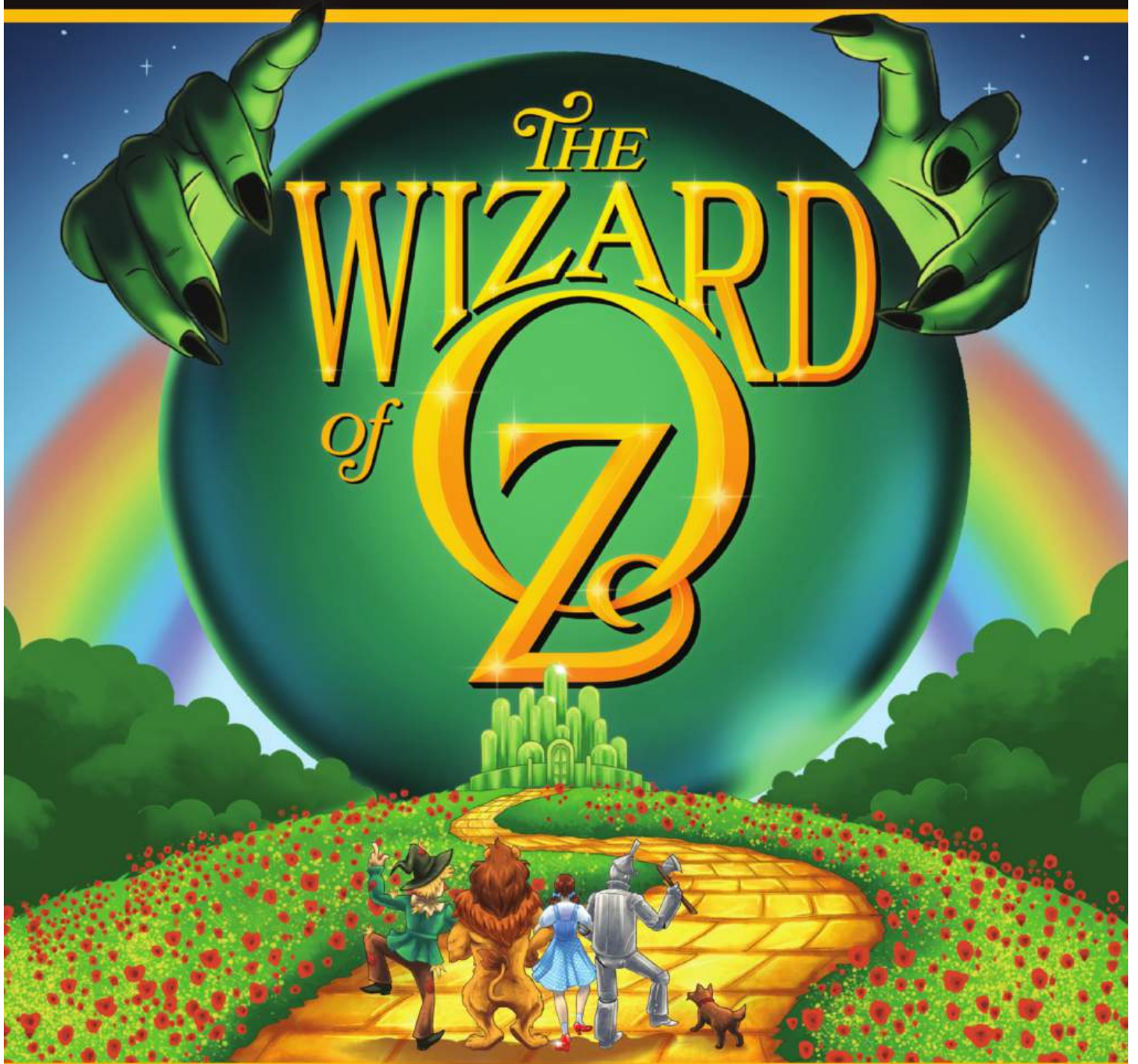

Meet Dr. Ruth Horowitz, Endocrinologist and LGBTQ+ Advocate

Recently, I sat down with Dr. Ruth Horowitz, Endocrinologist and LGBTQ+ Advocate. Dr. Horowitz is the Chief of the Division of Endocrinology at Greater Baltimore Medical Center and serves on the Pride committee to make GBMC a more inclusive and friendly institution for all. Dr. Horowitz is also one of the only endocrinologists in Maryland who's part of the World Professional Association for Transgender Health.



Dr. Horowitz grew up in a very progressive home; her father worked for the Social Security Administration and her mother was a social worker. During her childhood years, she remembers how her parents instilled in her equity for every person. After high school, she attended Oberlin College, a liberal and progressive school and then earned her medical degree from the University of Cincinnati College of Medicine.

Dr. Horowitz selected endocrinology because it is a more specialized medicine based on individual patient conditions and at many times, in endocrinology it's like solving a complicated problem for each patient. During her time at Oberlin College, Dr. Horowitz was exposed to the LGBTQ+ community. Through her family she first got involved in the trans community and was approached about practicing trans medicine. After some training and conferences, she realized that practicing trans medicine was no different than any other form of medicine.

A few years later, the pride committee at GBMC was holding a celebration for Transgender Day of Remembrance which prompted her to reach out to the committee chair and join the pride committee. As a member of that committee, she has helped to make GBMC more inviting and inclusive. The committee also participates in the local pride festival and parade, holds other celebrations during pride month and national coming out day, and holds trainings and workshops for staff on topics to advance inclusivity.

As we were getting near the end of the interview, I asked Dr. Horowitz, what are the biggest issues that you are currently facing? "Fear," she replied. People in the trans community are worried about getting access to their meds, healthcare and about being safe. They are worried about information in their medical records going to get them up for being harassed, arrested, or deported. Dr. Horowitz reassures them that Maryland is a very trans friendly state and has protections for the community and has seen many patients move from other not so friendly trans states to Maryland because of the support there.

Dr. Horowitz's recommendation for the LGBTQ+ community is support each other and be active in the community. For those that are considering starting the journey of transitioning, she recommends making sure that you have psychological support and work with a mental health provider at the same time starting hormone replacement therapy as well as having some deep conversations with your medical provider to consider things that you may have not thought of previously.

Then the unexpected happened. On a rainy Sunday afternoon, George's car skidded off a slippery road and into tree. His death was instant, and Trevor was suddenly faced with the very scenario he had been so reluctant to confront.

Because he had no will, George's estate passed through "intestacy." This meant that as an unmarried partner, Trevor inherited none of George's assets, except the house they owned jointly. Surprisingly, his car and bank accounts went to George's mother.

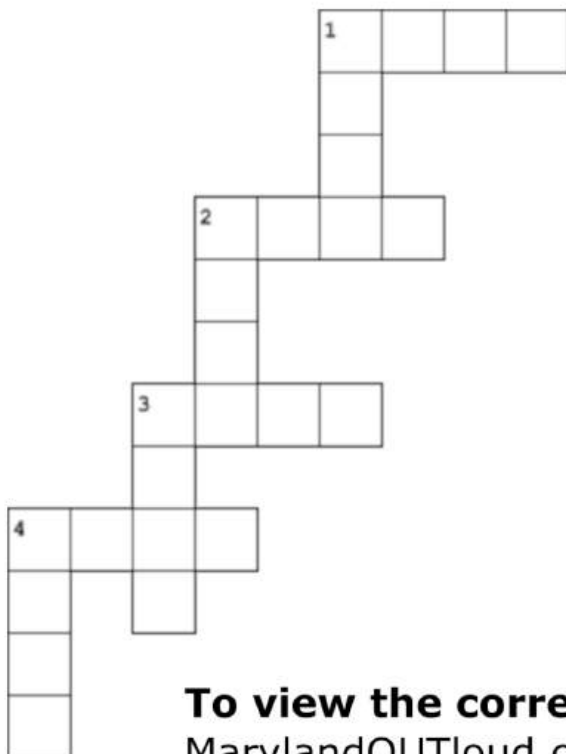
Bill had failed to name a beneficiary on his IRA, and because he and Trevor had never married, the money went to George's estate. This meant that George's mother also received this substantial asset. Bill had life insurance through his job, but he had set it up before he and Trevor met. The beneficiary was George's ex-boyfriend, so Trevor was entitled to none of the payout.

To add insult to injury, Trevor had no way to access George's laptop or iPad, which were both password-protected, or to listen to the messages that friends had left on George's phone when they heard about the accident.

It has been said that hindsight is always 20/20. If Bill and Trevor could start over, what would they do differently? They still might have stayed for that extra rum swizzle at the pub in Bermuda—that made for a good story. But they would definitely have called their friends' lawyer and had him prepare an estate plan for the two of them, rather than leave anything to chance.

There are times when I wonder about the existence of luck. Last Friday was one instance of this. I happened to be in London, for a day, and saw that there was a special exhibition of the works of Banksy about a 5 minute walk from where I was staying.

Banksy Limitless had transformed London's cultural heart into the stage for a groundbreaking exhibition of the world's most elusive and provocative street artist. Curated by experienced producers of Banksy exhibitions, this temporary showcase presented 250 works: from certified originals and rare, one-of-a-kind pieces to large-scale installations, digital works, photos, and sculptures. I saw specially reproduced works created exclusively for this London event. The power of these works, given the current international situation, was immense. 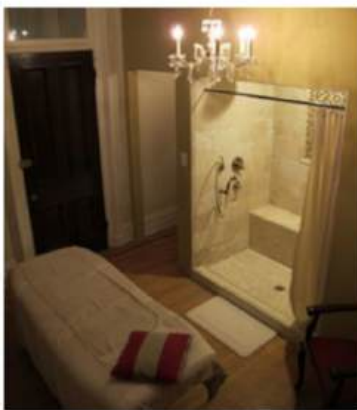
